IN MEMORIAM... Carla Zylstra

On October 24, 1932, a baby daughter was born to Bernard and Nellie (Van Genderen) Kooistra, and she was named Carla Rae. Her brother was Larry, who preceded her in death.

Carla received her grade school education in a country grade school, and she completed her education at Sully High School. Following graduation, she was united in marriage with Seymore Zylstra at the home of her parents. Zeke, the name we knew him by, was inducted into the US army, and served in Korea.

Following his discharge, Zeke and Carla established a home on a farm near Sully, and here they became the parents of five children. Carla was a busy mom and farm wife. She spent time working at the Coffee Cup Cafe following graduation, and after she had a family, she returned to the cafe where she totaled 30 years of service. We all loved her delicious pies and other goodies.

Zeke and Carla were very loyal followers of their grandchildren's activities. Those kids enjoyed Grandma's chocolate birthday cakes and after church coffee times. Carla was musically talented, both on the organ and piano. She used her vocal and instrumental talents in church, and she passed on her gifts to her children and grandchildren. We enjoyed some of these gifts in her memorial service.

Carla moved to The Cottages in Pella in January of 2021, and she passed away there on Thursday, September 14, 2023. Those left to cherish her memory are her five children: Craig (Linda), Curt (Donna), Sheri (Doug) Huyser, Kathy (Rod) Hoegh, Susan (Michael) Jansen, along with 15 grandchildren, 28 great-grand children and a host of other relatives and friends. She was preceded in death by her husband and many other family members and friends.

Services for Carla were held at the Sully CRC, where she was a faithful member following her profession of faith at the Sully Community Church. Interim pastor Bill Vis officiated with Shawn Huyser presenting memories, Lynnette Christiansen was the organist. "Goodness of God" was sung by Dylan Williams and Lindsey De Haan played a piano solo entitled 'How Deep the Father's Love For Us". Two songs-"It Is Well With My Soul" and "Amazing Grace" were hymns sung by the congregation. Casket Bearers were Jason and Brandon Zylstra, Logan Vos, Shawn, Jeremy, Dustin, Joel Huyser, and Corey, Ryan, and Troy Jansen. Internment was in the Sully cemetery. Memorials were designated for Hope Ministries. Lunch was served at the Sully First Reformed Church.

Dear friends,

News can be good or bad. News of the birth of a child is good news. News that a biopsy shows the presence of cancer is bad news. Good news leads to joy and bad news makes us anxious and fearful.

Good or bad news not only touches our emotions, but it also motivates our actions. News of the impending birth of a child leads us to take concrete steps to prepare to care for that child. News of a positive result on a biopsy calls for the implementation of a treatment plan.

The Gospel is unadulterated good news. It is not just good advice or even a religious self-improvement plan. The gospel is the good news: Jesus is Lord. Satan is defeated. Our salvation is complete. The Kingdom is here. We are forgiven. The Spirit lives within us. We are blessed with every spiritual blessing and nothing can separate us from the love of God. (See Heidelberg Catechism, Question and Answer #1)

In the past couple of months, we have worked hard as GraceChristian School to clarify our mission and vision. We have chosen this as our motto: "Disciples in the Shaping: Equipping students with identity and purpose."

This is a bold statement. We are asserting that the good news of the gospel as spoken and demonstrated in a Christian school does more than produce good feelings. We are asserting that this good news will produce visible change in our students' identity and purpose. In fact, if we don't see our students growing in identity and purpose, we may well need to question whether it is the gospel that we are speaking and demonstrating as a school!

These are a few of the ways we have seen our Grace community of students, parents and teachers growing in identity and purpose in the last few months:

- A first-grade student embracing and welcoming back a classmate who had been absent for a couple of weeks.
- Fourth and Fifth grade students taking the lead by organizing a fun way of implementing our new code of student conduct.
- Parents volunteering their time, skills, and financial resources toward the launch of our kindergarten," Little Lambs," as well as the expansion of our facilities to the first floor of our building.
- Teachers that creatively integrate a gospel worldview into subjects like science, social studies and physical education.

As Jeannie and I have grown in Christ, our joy in the gospel has increased. This joy is a feeling but also more than a feeling. We are learning that unlike a mere feeling this joy does not depend on outer circumstances. We have experienced that this joy is not something we can produce. It is the fruit of resting in the gospel as the true account of who we are in Christ and of what we have been called to do. And we continue to learn each day!

In this Christmas season we wish each of you the great joy of the good news of the gospel. We pray that it will anchor your identity and empower your purpose. We are confident that the joy of the Lord will be your strength no matter what the new year brings.

I received my last copy of The Chimes a few days ago and as always I enjoyed it very much. I was glad to hear all the fellows and all of you folks back at home are getting along fine. I'm still getting along just fine, and I am not too busy. The time is going rather slow too. I guess I'm getting too anxious to get out of this place.



I was sure glad to hear that Quint is finally back home and out of the army. I guess they will be getting out right along now, but also there will be some coming in, which isn't so good, but the way it looks now is that this is the way it will be yet for a while. We have been having some pretty cold weather over here. That wind off the ocean is really cold, and the stone buildings we have here aren't exactly the best.
